Acknowledgement of Indigenous Peoples

The Town of Rocky Mountain House wishes to acknowledge that the land on which we gather is Treaty 6 Territory and a traditional meeting ground and home for many Indigenous Peoples, including the Blackfoot, Cree, Saulteaux, Stoney and Métis.

Clean Energy Improvement Program

The Town of Rocky Mountain House has been working closely with Municipal Climate Change Action Center (MCCAC) to develop its Clean Energy Improvement Program (CEIP). This program is a voluntary way for property owners to finance clean energy improvement in their homes and businesses. The program launch for residential applications is expected this year, and will be the first of its kind in Alberta.

Fees Rates and Charges

Council passed the Town's Fees, Rates and Charges Bylaw for 2021. This bylaw consolidates all Town fees and rates in one document for administrative and residents' convenience.

The 2021 bylaw clarifies the residential, non-residential and out-of-town fees for accessing recycling programs at the Eco Centre. Rates are unchanged from 2020 for Town properties, and will soon include residential curbside organics collection service included with the existing fees.

Waste Management Bylaw

Council passed first reading of a new Waste Management Bylaw, reflecting the recent changes to Waste Collection Services, the upcoming Organics Program, the recent opening of the Town's Eco Centre and the improved recycling services. The bylaw will return for Council's consideration on Feb. 9.

Water, Sewer and Storm Utility Bylaw

Council passed a new Water, Sewer and Storm Utility Bylaw to administer the operation of those utility systems. The new bylaw reflects standard utility service practices and requirements, and replaces the 2019 water, sewer and solid waste bylaw.

Sanitary Sewer Back-up Policy

Council adopted a Sanitary Sewer Back-up Policy, which identifies responsibility of Town and propertyowners in the event of a sewer back-up affecting private property.

Council reviewed a recent Alberta Environment and Parks (AEP) request for the Town to conduct an environmental impact study of the water that is discharged back into the river from the Water Treatment Plant. This is part of the current renewal process of the Town's water treatment licence. Council has asked Administration to meet with AEP about the request and bring more details back to Council later this spring.

Council approved a new Engineering Tech/Project Manager position in the Engineering & Operations Department.
